- Call for 10/11 applications May/June 2010








Progress to date

- · Education and Professional Development Committee
- Working group formed
- · Blue sky day October 2008
- Work began developing new framework
- Draft work circulated to all IPS members and wider stakeholders
- · Final draft now in progress
- Collaboration with Department of Health and all 5 countries
- Mapping with eKSF and format of framework
- Endorsement by Higher Education Institutes

Important considerations

- · Not 'one size fits all'
- Applicable to all nations
- · Map to eKSF for PDPs
- · NHS and non NHS
- Multi professional
- Take account of evolving infection prevention and control roles and responsibilities
- Inclusion of 'softer skills'
- Inclusion of both specialist knowledge and skills
- Workable and user friendly



IPS Collaboration internationally

- Long history of collaboration with APIC, CHICA, IFIC
- Collaboration continues with these societies
- · Examples include:
 - Support for each others conferences
 Dialogue and discussion to support journal development
 - Joint support for IFIC initiatives

European collaboration

- Prior to 2009 no Europe-wide network existed for infection prevention & control.
- · Meeting of interested societies held
- 'Berlin declaration' agreed and supported by many societies across Europe (JIP 2009)
- IPS is a member of the co-ordinating group for the network

Formalising collaboration

- Proposal for network to become a legal entity and become a 'society of societies'
- IPS Board currently reviewing proposal; will identify best participation option for the benefit of our members
- IPS committed to continue with collaborative working with the network on key issues

Benefits to date

- ECDC (European Centre for Disease Control) issuing tenders for programmes of work on patient safety, including infection
- Sub-group of societies, including IPS, submitted successful proposal to ECDC for work on needs assessment for infection control training in Europe.

Benefit for IPS Members

- ECDC work to inform development of a European Union competency and curriculum framework for specialist infection prevention & control practice.
- Work is based on IPSE competencies, and develops this further
- IPS competency work fits well with this, and use of IPS competencies will mean members are well placed for future EU directives
