Background

- Patient hand hygiene within clinical setting
- Limited focus towards patient hand hygiene
- Limited research surrounding patient hand hygiene
- Research grant from NHS Tayside

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Co-Applicants: Dr Karen Lee (Senior Lecturer, Dundee University) Mrs Patricia Kydd (ICN, NHS Tayside)

Research Aims

- Explore perceptions of nurses and patients towards patient hand hygiene
- Identify and address current clinical practice
- Identification of patient's needs and gaps in clinical practice

Research Design

- Descriptive mixed methodological study - Acute medical, surgical and orthopaedic wards
- Observational sessions - Staff and patient practice
- Staff survey questionnaires
 - Perceptions, attitudes and self reported behaviour
- Patient interviews
 - Perceptions, attitudes and clinical practice

Study Sample

- Purposive sampling
- Observations

 Clinical practice within bay areas
- Staff survey questionnaires
 - Nursing staff on duty in each of the six wards, caring for patients in bay areas
- Patient interviews
 - Patients situated in bay areas (dependency scores of 2 5)

Data Collection

- Observational sessions

 In bay areas during a morning shift (07:30am
 11:00am) of each ward
- Staff questionnaires

 10 questions (various response format)
- Patient interviews
 - 10 interview semi- structured questions


Results

- 33 nursing staff completed questionnaire
- 6 observational sessions undertaken
- 22 patients interviewed
- Very poor clinical practice observed in relation to patient hand hygiene
- Conflicting information provided from nursing staff
- Patient's viewed their own hand hygiene as important but were not provided with the opportunities to carry it out.

Results (Cont.)

- Hand wipes on meal trolleys, issued to individual patients, and at every patient bed
- More encouragement and assistance from staff
- More accessible facilities
- Provide patients with individual hand gels
- Display of posters and notices/distribution of leaflets to patient on admission
- Staff and patient education on the importance of hand hygiene

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



Successful Utilisation of PDSA Cycle for Implementation of Patient Hand Wipes

- Five wards of mixed speciality
- One nurse, one patient
- Three nurses, three patients
- Five nurses, five patients
- Final spread out of wipes in every directorate/ hospital throughout NHS Tayside
